# 2024-2025

- In the 2024 National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE), seniors reported that N.C. A&T significantly outpaced peers at public R1 and R2 institutions in contributing to their development across seven of 10 surveyed areas:
  - o clear and effective communication
  - o acquiring job-related knowledge and skills
  - o working collaboratively
  - o developing a personal code of values and ethics
  - o understanding diverse backgrounds
  - o solving complex real-world problems
  - o being an informed and active citizen.
- According to the 2024 NSSE, N.C. A&T seniors on average spend 5.9 hours a week devoted to community service or volunteer work, almost three more hours than peers at public R1 and R2 institutions.
- A&T graduates earn more than those of any other public historically Black University and rank third among all University of North Carolina campuses (Forbes' "Best Colleges 2024")

# **U.S. NEWS & WORLD REPORT'S BEST COLLEGES 2025**

- On the HBCU rankings, A&T's peer ranking improved to 4.4, second only to Spelman College among all HBCUs
- A&T rose 49 places among national universities (231) and 25 places (126) among public universities, its highest ranking to date for either category
- A&T rose 42 spots (36) in the social mobility category, which measures how well universities prepare students for careers that significantly improve their economic circumstances
