DEGREE AUDIT. *After completing 75 credit hours of course work*, students should request a degree audit and meet with the chairperson of the Department of Economics (225 Merrick Hall) to verify their graduation plan.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS. If all requirements are not completed within six years after admission, students are expected to conform to the University Bulletin requirements specified for the class with which graduation is anticipated. To graduate, students must earn a minimum of 120 semester hours in the specified curriculum, excluding deficiency and/or remedial courses, with a cumulative grade point average of 2.00 or better for all courses taken.

WITHDRAWALS/REPEATS. Students may withdraw (W) from a total of only 16 credits throughout their entire degree. Students may also repeat a total of 16 graded credits throughout their entire degree. Withdrawals do not count as repeats; however, transferred courses do count as repeats.
