Unleashing the Power of ChatGPT: Conversations in the Age of AI

Abstract: Join us for an interactive discussion about the use of generative artificial intelligence (AI) and its impacts on graduate education. We will discuss how faculty and graduate students should consider the uses of generative AI tools and the implications for research and teaching. We will also facilitate discussion about the considerations for graduate school administrators in this evolving area.

Empowering Graduate Students' Career Development: The Accelerate to Industry (A2i) Initiative

Abstract: The main goal of this presentation to the NCCGS is to provide an overview of the A2i program, how the partnership with our academic partner institutions has worked, and the results we have seen from the A2i programs held at Duke University and North Carolina State University.

Ängela Bonner, Associate Director, Career Readiness Duke University Career Center: A native of Winston-Salem, NC, Ängela received a Bachelor of Arts in Athletic Training from the University of North Carolina Wilmington in 2005 where she was also a Student-Athlete on the Track & Field Team. She continued her education, earning a Master of Science in Athletic Administration from North Carolina Central University in 2007.



Currently, Ängela serves as an Associate Director of Career Readiness in the Duke Career Center. She manages day-to-day operations and career development programming, including the Accelerate to Industry (A2i) program that assists PhD students seeking to change their career trajectory from academia to industry. Her previous role as an Assistant Director allowed her the opportunity to manage the Education, Government, Non-Profit and Policy Career Community along with implementation of both the career center and student affairs unit events.

While pursuing her Master's, she had dual roles within the athletic department's Sports Medicine and Compliance units. After completing her studies, she worked with the NCCU Student-Athlete Academic Support Services. Her interest in student academic success and development propelled her into academic advising and program development for first-time freshmen, sophomore, and transfer students that spanned ten years. While at NCCU, she served in various capacities under University College, culminating as the Interim Academic Advising Coordinator for University College. Ängela is passionate about creating access and opportunities for students and truly enjoys engaging with them as they construct their pathway to success!

Jill Huerta, Ph.D., Assistant Dean and Director, The Reynolds Center for Graduate Life and Learning; Graduate Program Director, Certificate in Workplace Competencies, The Graduate School at UNC Charlotte: Dr. Jill Huerta joined UNC Charlotte in 2018 from the University of Michigan's Ross School of Business. At Michigan, she managed MBA recruitment and admissions for the Latin America, Europe, and U.S. regions, built

partnerships with companies and non-profits, and created and executed professional development programming. As a business historian, Dr. Huerta has taught U.S. History for more than a decade. Her educational background includes a bachelor's degree in Economics from the University of Michigan and a doctorate in U.S. Business History from Michigan State University, where her research analyzed the politics behind late 20th-century U.S. banking regulation.

Kelly Rownd, Direct or Career Readiness, The Graduate School at NCSU: Kelly joined the North Carolina State University (NCSU) Graduate School in July 2023 as the Director of Career Readiness, where she builds a culture of career for graduate students and postdoctoral scholars in holistic career development, specifically through the A2i program. Prior to NCSU, Kelly worked at Louisiana State University (LSU) for 7 years, serving in various roles

within the Olinde Career Center and Enrollment Management Office to empower and equip students and alumni in their career exploration and





preparation. Kelly holds a B.S. in Sports Administration from LSU and a M.Ed. in Educational Leadership & Policy Analysis from the University of Missouri.

Rhonda Sutton, Ph.D., Assistant Dean for Professional Development, The Graduate School at NCSU: Dr. Rhonda Sutton is the Assistant Dean for Professional Development in the Graduate School at North Carolina State University. She has served in higher education administration for over 20 years at NC State University as the second director for the Women's Center, an assistant vice provost in the former Office for Equal Opportunity, the first



director of the Office of Postdoctoral Affairs, and the Director of Leadership Programs in the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences. Dr. Sutton is a licensed mental health counselor in the state of North Carolina; she has worked in counseling settings in higher education, private practice, and at a mental health hospital. She received her B.A. from Appalachian State University in Business Administration and her Master's and Ph.D. in Counselor Education from NC State University.

Enhancing Academic Integrity in Graduate Education

Abstract: Academic Integrity policies and practices differ by institution. Graduate Schools that oversee policies specific to graduate students may have more effective practices than those with more general codes of conduct. At UNC Charlotte, a hybrid approach is being developed. Through a case study discussion, we will facilitate a discussion of creative ideas and best practices for building strong cultures of academic integrity in graduate education.

Katherine Hall-Hertel is the Associate Dean for Graduate Academic and Student Affairs at UNC Charlotte. Her career includes stints in student affairs and legal education before transitioning to graduate education. Dr. Hall-Hertel advocates for holistic support for graduate students, which includes transparent academic policies and practices. She is a past chair of the Administrators in Graduate and Professional Student Services community with NASPA. Currently, she serves as the VP for Advocacy with the NC Council of Graduate Schools.



Sandra Krause has nearly 30 years of experience in higher education. Dr. Krause has extensive experience in graduate education, ranging from program coordination and management to serving as Director of Graduate Admissions at Appalachian State University. Currently, she holds the position of Assistant Dean for Graduate Academic Services at Charlotte. She also brings a decade of international experience in a variety of settings.

Assistantship Administration: Best Practices, Ideas, and Tips

Abstract: Graduate assistantships are a key component of the graduate school experience and take considerable staff and faculty time to award and administer. This panel discussion will feature two UNC System institutions who will discuss their best practices for administering graduate assistantships at their institutions. Panelists will share their institution's efficiencies, processes, and practices for ensuring smooth awarding and processing of teaching, research, and administrative assistantships for their graduate students. Following their presentations, a moderator will help engage the audience in a question-and-answer session so attendees can continue to hear ideas and practices that could help at their own institution.

Kathleen T. Cox, Ph.D., is currently serving as Interim Dean of the Graduate School at East Carolina University. Previously, she served as an Associate Dean in the Graduate School. She started her career at ECU in 1996 as a faculty member in the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders as a graduate speech-language pathology faculty member. She is currently President-Elect of NCCGS and will serve as President in 2024.

Julie Goodliffe, PhD is Assistant Dean for Funding and Research in the Graduate School at the University of North Carolina Charlotte, helping graduate students pay for their education and research. Her group provides over \$15 million in tuition and stipend support, manages employment contracts for 3,000 graduate assistants on campus, and runs competitive, internal fellowship programs for summer support. Dr. Goodliffe serves as a reviewer for the National





Science Foundation, and uses that experience to train and support students as they apply for fellowships and grants. Dr. Goodliffe began her career as a scientist, earning her Ph.D. at Johns Hopkins and first joining UNC Charlotte as Assistant Professor of Biology. After successfully funding her research laboratory and graduating 5 graduate students from her program, Dr. Goodliffe earned an MBA from UNC Kenan-Flagler Business School and joined the Graduate School as an administrator. From her experience with grant funding and all sides of graduate education, Dr. Goodliffe understands the challenges students, faculty, and administrators face. Her time in business school helps her see the world in new ways and work to align incentives and support students and faculty.

Savita Sharma is the Assistant Dean for Finance, Operations, and IT at the NCSU Graduate School. In her role, she provides leadership over the Graduate Assistantship, Graduate student financial support, and Graduate student data functions. She also provides strategic guidance over the Graduate School finance and HR functions. Before joining NCSU, Savita was the Chief of Staff to the Vice President for Finance and CFO



at Virginia Tech. She is passionate about process assessment and improvement to provide exceptional customer service efficiently.

Enhancing Power with Successful Fundraising and Development Strategies

Abstract: This session will explore how graduate schools can engage in donor cultivation and philanthropy. This will include ways to partner with central advancement, different approaches to garnering external support, and some of the issues/challenges faced that are unique to the graduate sphere.

Peter Harries currently serves as the Dean of the Graduate at NC State and is dedicated to promoting and advocating for graduate education and graduate students across the university and beyond. Since arriving at NC State in 2015, Dr. Harries has been working with partners across the institution to continue the evolution of the institution's graduate programs and advocating on issues critical to that development. Harries started his administrative career as an



Interim Associate Dean in the Graduate School at USF in 2011. He continued in that role until moving to NC State as Senior Associate Dean in 2015. He received his Bachelor's of Science in Geology & Geophysics with Honors in 1984 from Yale University and the University of Colorado, Boulder for his PhD. He started his academic career at the University of South Florida (USF), Tampa, initially as a Visiting Assistant Professor, was hired as an Assistant Professor in 1993, and advanced through the ranks to become a Full Professor. As a faculty member at USF, he received university-wide teaching and research awards. His research focuses on invertebrate paleontology, especially the biotic response to mass extinction events, and comparing biotic responses to greenand icehouse climates.

Quashing Quiet Quitting: Applying Deci and Ryan's Self-Determination Theory to Empower Graduate School Staff

Abstract: Graduate studies staff play a critical role in supporting graduate students' academic goals. However, they often face challenges such as burnout, lack of control over their work, and difficulty in maintaining work-life balance. This presentation will center on the use of self-determination theory (SDT) as a strategy to support individuals working in graduate studies (Deci & Ryan). Applying this theory can help create a more motivated, engaged, and committed workforce that is better equipped to support graduate students in achieving their academic and professional goals.

Sydney Brown is Dean of the Gayle Bolt Price School of Graduate Studies and a professor in the College of Education at Gardner-Webb University. She is a tripleheel UNC-Chapel Hill alumna with a BA in Education, M.Ed. in Literacy Studies, and a Ph.D. in Culture, Curriculum, and Change. Her research involves strengthsbased leadership and supporting doctoral students through the dissertation process. She has served as Dean since 2018.



Jennifer Putnam is Associate Dean of the College of Education at Gardner-Webb University and coordinator of the doctoral program in curriculum and instruction. She has served in these roles since 2018. She received her BS and MA in Elementary Education from Appalachian State and her EdD in Curriculum and Instruction from Gardner-Webb. Her research involves motivation, teacher leadership, and facilitating positive, sustainable change.

Maximizing Impact: Developing Postdoc Programs for Researcher and Institutional Excellence

Abstract: Postdoctoral researchers (postdocs) are an integral part of the research enterprise in academia and industry. They comprise a pool of highly trained and qualified researchers who work in laboratories and research groups led by principal investigators (PIs) who supervise their work. In recent years, there has been increased attention on the management and training of postdocs to ensure their successful tenure. This seminar will explore strategies and best practices for effectively managing, training, and developing postdocs as detailed below, accompanied by a discussion of what constitutes a successful postdoc tenure.

1) Training and Development of postdocs: This is an essential aspect of managing postdocs as it can enhance their skills, expand their knowledge base, and increase their productivity. The training and development provided to postdocs should be tailored to their specific career plans, interests, and goals. These may include technical and soft skills training, networking opportunities, international collaborations, and participation in conferences and workshops,

2) Postdoc Management (i.e., recruitment, selection, orientation, mentoring, and supervision): Effective supervision of postdocs entails proper orientation, intentional goal setting, and mentoring along with the provision of feedback and regular communication to ensure that the postdoc is making optimal progress towards achieving his or her goals.

3) Postdoc Tenure: Factors that contribute to a successful postdoc tenure include a clear research agenda, an effective transition to an independent

research career (whether in academia or industry), an active publication record, and effective mentoring relationships.

LaRico Treadwell, Ph.D. (PI, Advanced Materials Laboratory; Chemist) is a Senior Member of Technical Staff in the Advanced Materials Laboratory at Sandia National Laboratories. Dr. Treadwell has a B.S. in Chemistry from the University of Mississippi and a Ph.D. in Inorganic/Solid State Chemistry from Louisiana State University, where he studied metal and



ceramic structure property relationships in physics-related phenomena (i.e., spin glass, magnetic frustration, heavy fermion). While at Sandia, he helped develop new capabilities to synthesize new materials from the nano to micro scale utilizing microwave, thermal, air-free, and high-pressure techniques. He has also helped develop advanced fabrication and processing techniques to make reinforced composites, nanocomposites, and metal alloys/oxides for DOE and Nuclear enterprise programs. He is currently involved with several research projects including the development of 3D printed corrosion sensors, nanofilled hybrid 3D printed materials, fabrication of autonomous smart devices, thermoelectric/metamaterials, and reinforced/nano composite fabrication. He has published over 30 publications and is named on over 15 patents.

Dr. Treadwell is the CEO of E4 Consulting. E4 Consulting provides interactive and informative consultation on education, engagement, empowerment, and elevation to schools, organizations, businesses, and all entities to intentionally grow the number of minorities, 1st generations, and underrepresented in STEM, J.D., and Higher Education Success. Consulting services range from grant writing to professional development with all employment levels as the team applies expertise and innovative strategies to identify and tackle complex organizational challenges, bridging the gap in Academic and Professional sectors.

In addition to technical roles, Dr. Treadwell is a husband and father of five and actively participates in several community support activities to encourage the youth to pursue careers in STEM, with a special focus on encouraging excitement around Chemistry.

Kiera Alston is a Master of Clinical Psychology candidate at North Carolina Central University (NCCU), serving in the role of President of the Graduate Student Association for the academic year of 2023-2024. Her role as President entails the responsibility of representing and advocating for the interests of graduate students at the university. She has previously served in the role of Vice President of GSA, where she gained valuable experience in leadership

and collaboration. Beyond her involvement with GSA, she is a Graduate Admissions Specialist and holds the position of Chair of NCCU's Student Affairs Committee. In this role, she plays a pivotal part in shaping policies and initiatives that increase graduate recruitment and retention rates while positively impacting the well-being and academic journey of NCCU graduate students.

Jazmine Cuffee resides in Chesapeake, Virginia and is the youngest of four children. She is the first child from her family to attend college and pursue a higher education in an intensive field of study. Growing up, her family used to call her "bookworm" or "TreeHugger" due to her love for school, nature, and science. Supreme Court Admissions Decision: Open Forum on Campus Responses

Abstract: The session will provide an opportunity to share initial actions to comply with the decision, initial reactions by faculty, staff, and students to the decision, and plans for the future.

Elizabeth "Beth" Mayer-Davis, Ph.D., RD, is the Dean of The Graduate School and the Cary C. Boshamer Distinguished Professor of Nutrition and Medicine. She has focused her career on diabetes, including the epidemiology and natural history of type 1 and type 2 diabetes in children and adults. Throughout her career, Dean Beth Mayer-Davis has mentored numerous graduate students. She is committed to diversity, equity,



and inclusion and ensuring that our graduate students have access to professional development and mental health and well-being tools to support them during their time at Carolina. Dean Mayer-Davis believes that graduate students are emblematic of innovation made fundamental and are capable and prepared to address humanity's greatest challenges. Simply put, graduate students are pivotal to how Carolina powers its economic and research engine—reaching all areas of our state through research, teaching, and public service. Under her leadership, The Graduate School supports graduate students and champions graduate education in our state.

Formerly the chair of the Department of Nutrition at the UNC Gillings School of Global Public Health, she also co-directs the Nutrition Obesity Research Center. An accomplished scholar, she is the principal investigator for the Carolina site of the SEARCH for Diabetes in Youth study, and she serves as the national co-chairperson for a large multi-center study. She has served on the University's Faculty Executive Committee for several years. Dean Mayer-Davis serves as principal investigator for a National Institutes of Health Nutrition for Precision Health Consortium initiative and has received additional funding from the NIH to promote diversity in nutrition, obesity, and diabetes research. She is active in the American Diabetes Association and was the 2011 president for Health Care and Education for the Association.
